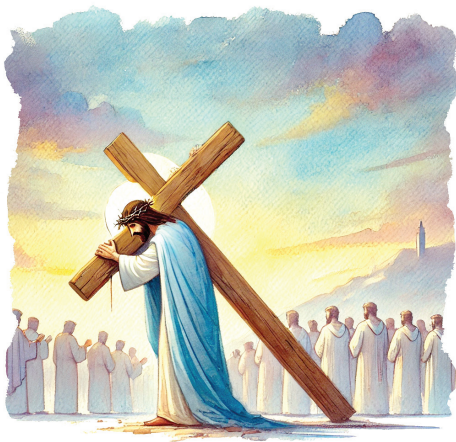
First Station

JESUS IS CONDEMNED TO DEATH

“God is love, and his love is the greatest revolution in the history of mankind, because it overcomes evil in a most radical way. It overcomes death. It transforms the world not by a worldly power but by the power of the cross. And this love, which is God, must be lived and must be communicated by us. In this way, the cross becomes a source of hope and joy.”

Third Station JESUS FALLS THE FIRST TIME

He calls us to be attentive to the suffering of others and to be instruments of mercy and healing. For every fall, there is a hand ready to raise us up, and every wound can be healed by his grace.”

Fourth Station
JESUS MEETS HIS MOTHER

In her, we find a mother whose heart opens to our every sorrow. When all seems lost, she stands firm. She is a constant reminder that with God, there is always hope, and that the greatest love endures through the deepest pain.”

Fifth Station

SIMON OF CYRENE HELPS JESUS CARRY THE CROSS

“There is no such thing as true charity without a willingness to carry one another’s burdens. In this we imitate Christ himself, who took upon himself the burden of humanity. Even when we are compelled to help, as Simon was, let us not shy away but see it as an opportunity to serve Christ in our brothers and sisters. When we bear one another’s burdens, we become the very hands of God’s grace.”

Sixth Station

VERONICA WIPES THE FACE OF JESUS

“Each time a small act of kindness is performed, it reflects the face of God. Whether it is wiping a tear, speaking a gentle word, or lending a listening ear, it is a gesture of God’s own tenderness and compassion. This love, however small, restores the dignity of the person and reveals the true image of God within us. Never underestimate the power of a small act of love to transform a life.”

Seventh Station JESUS FALLS THE SECOND TIME

Christ, carrying the cross and falling under its weight, is a reminder that love bears all things and never gives up, even in the face of failure. In our own struggles, his perseverance is our strength, and his determination to carry the burden of sin to the very end is our hope.”

Lord, as you fell a second time, overwhelmed by the weight of sin, help us not to despair in our failures. Teach us to see your perseverance and love, which carry us when we are weak. May we rise again through your strength, and may our resolve to do good never falter, even when we stumble. Amen.



Eighth Station

JESUS MEETS THE WOMEN OF JERUSALEM

“The Church cannot remain silent when human dignity is at stake. Wherever people are humiliated, exploited, or made to suffer, the Church’s voice must resound in defense of the oppressed. Christ’s encounter with the weeping women was not a moment of self-pity, but a call to recognize the greater pain of a world wounded by sin. Let us weep not only for our own sufferings but for the injustices that afflict humanity.”

Lord, as you met the women of Jerusalem, you reminded them to weep for the sins of the world. Open our eyes to see beyond our own pain and to recognize the suffering of others. Give us the courage to speak out against injustice and to comfort those who are hurting. May our tears become prayers for healing and change in a world marred by sin. Amen.



Ninth Station JESUS FALLS THE THIRD TIME

When we fall under the weight of suffering, it is not our strength that will carry us forward, but his. It is in our greatest weakness that his power is made perfect. Let us, therefore, welcome Christ into our pain, knowing that his grace is sufficient for us.”

When we are crushed by life's burdens, may we find hope in your presence within our suffering. Lift us up with your strength, that we may continue on, trusting in your sustaining grace. Amen.



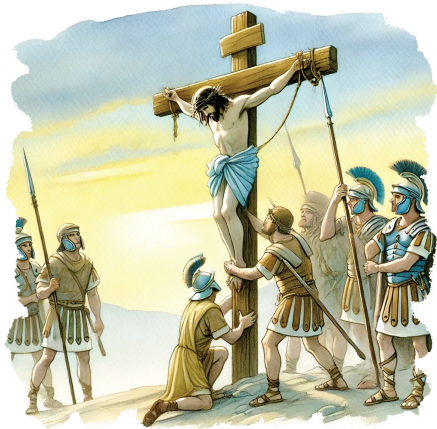
Tenth Station

JESUS IS STRIPPED OF HIS GARMENTS

“The Christian is called to stand with the naked, the hungry, and the persecuted, to see Christ in them and to serve them with love. As Jesus was stripped of his dignity, he showed us that true dignity does not come from the clothing we wear, the status we hold, or the possessions we own. It comes from being children of God, beloved in his eyes, even in our nakedness and shame.”

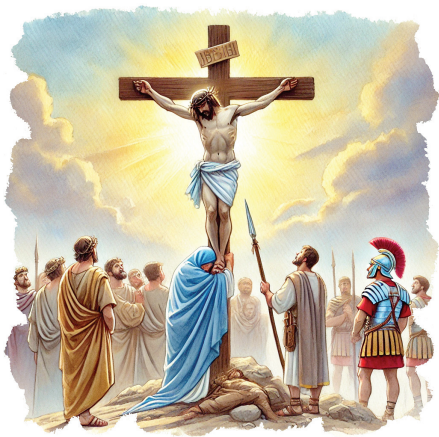


Eleventh Station JESUS IS NAILED TO THE CROSS

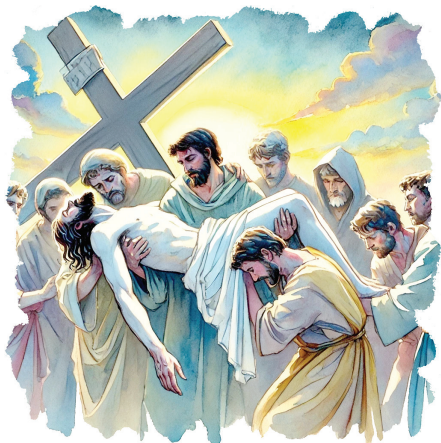


Twelfth Station JESUS DIES ON THE CROSS

As we gaze upon the crucified Lord, let us remember that we are called to die to ourselves so that we may live for God.”

Thirteenth Station

JESUS IS TAKEN DOWN FROM THE CROSS

Yet, even in the face of such sorrow, there is hope. For Mary knew that this was not the end. The dead body of her son was a seed of new life, the promise of the resurrection.”

Fourteenth Station JESUS IS LAID IN THE TOMB

“The tomb is the place where hope seemed buried, yet from it emerged eternal life. We must not be afraid of the tomb, for it is a place of transformation. The world may see it as an end, but faith sees it as a beginning. For the one who lay in the tomb is the Lord of Life, and in him, our own lives find their true meaning and destiny.”
