

Who Was Carlo Acutis?

Carlo Acutis was the son of Italian parents, born on May 3, 1991 in London, England. While Carlo was still very young, his parents moved back to Milan, Italy, where he was raised.

Carlo was a happy and bright child with an eager mind. He had a strong curiosity and always wanted to learn more about anything around him. Carlo's parents were not super







religious, but somehow Carlo found a strong connection to God from an early age. It was as if faith was something he just naturally understood.



When Carlo was only seven-years-old he asked his parents if he could receive his First Holy Communion. Both the church and his parents agreed that he was ready. This was

very special since Carlo was younger than most children who receive their First Holy Communion, but Carlo's deep faith and love for God had shown to all those around him. Carlo had his First Holy Communion at a special monastery in Milan.

After receiving Communion, Carlo made a promise to attend mass every day, which he did for the rest of his life. For Carlo,



the Eucharist was the most important thing in the world, because it was his way of being close to Jesus.

Even as a young boy, Carlo understood the true value of the Eucharistic connection with

God. This is something that takes most people a lifetime to realize.

Though Carlo had his strong faith, he still thoroughly enjoyed his child-like fun by playing soccer and video games with friends and being around animals.

Carlo was born in the early 1990s, a time when technology was beginning to take off. Computers, the internet, and video games were becoming a big part of life, and like many kids his age, Carlo was fascinated by all of it.

In Carlo's eyes, technology was a gift from God, and he wanted to use it in the best way possible.



Carlo Acutis is often referred to as the first "Millennial Saint" because he was born in 1991, during the Millennial generation.

Many people think of saints as people who lived a long time ago, but Carlo is proof that even people in today's world can live holy lives. He knew how to balance his love of video games, computers, and social media with his faith in God.

He understood the influence and importance of what technology had to offer and chose









to use it wisely and not get distracted by things like materialism or popularity.

Carlo was never worried about having the latest gadgets or

clothes; instead, he focused on using what he had to help others and remain close to God.

A Sudden Illness and Carlo's Death

A Hero's Faith in Hard Times

When Carlo was 15 years old, his life took an unexpected turn. In 2006, he was diagnosed with a serious form of leukemia, a type of cancer that affects the blood. This was shocking because Carlo had been a healthy, active teenager who loved life.

Despite this terrible news, Carlo remained hopeful and positive. He accepted his illness



with courage and faith. He offered up his suffering for the Church, the Pope and anyone in need.

Even though he was very sick, Carlo never complained. He continued to focus on his love for God and his desire to help others. Carlo once said, "I am happy to die because I have lived my life without wasting a minute on those things that do not please God." These words show how deeply Carlo trusted in God's plan for his life, even though he didn't know why he was suffering.

Carlo died on October 12, 2006, in Monza, Italy. His body was later moved to Assisi, a town he loved because of its connection to St.

Francis of Assisi, a saint Carlo greatly admired. Carlo's death was heart-breaking for his family and friends, but his faith and courage inspired many people to see life in a new way.





Why Carlo was Sainted Steps to Sainthood

Soon after Carlo's death, people began to see that he had lived a truly extraordinary life, even though he was only 15. His deep love for the Eucharist, his kindness toward others, and his use of technology to spread his faith made him stand out. In 2013, the Catholic Church began investigating Carlo's life to see if he should be recognized as a saint.

Becoming a saint in the Catholic Church involves several steps. First, the person must be declared "Venerable," meaning that the Church recognizes they lived a life full of virtue and faith. In 2018, Pope Francis declared Carlo "Venerable," marking the first official step toward sainthood.

The next step is "Beatification" which requires proof that the person has performed a miracle. In Carlo's case, a miracle happened in Brazil in 2013. A little boy who was very sick with a rare condition was healed after





his family prayed to Carlo for help. After the Vatican carefully studied this event, they confirmed it was a miracle through Carlo's interces-

sion (this means that Carlo had helped bring about the healing from Heaven). On October 10, 2020, Carlo Acutis was officially beatified in Assisi, the town he loved so much. Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, the ceremony was live streamed so people from all over the world could watch it. This seems fitting for someone like Carlo, who believed in using the internet to bring people closer to God.

Beatification is an important step toward becoming a saint, but it's not the last one. To be fully declared a saint, there needs to be another confirmed miracle. This second miracle was recognized by the Vatican on May 23, 2024







when a Costa Rican woman named Valeria Valverde was near death after a bicycle accident in 2022. Her mother, Lilliana, prayed at Acutis's tomb and Valeria made a miraculous recovery.

Pope Francis recognized these two miracles of Carlo Acutis, along with the powerful impact his life continues to have on people around the world, in declaring Carlo's canonization (officially declared a saint) on April 27, 2025 during the Jubilee of Youth.
